The most exciting thing that's been happening this year at Jindibah is feeling what it's like as more and more families finish their homes and move onto our 113 acres.

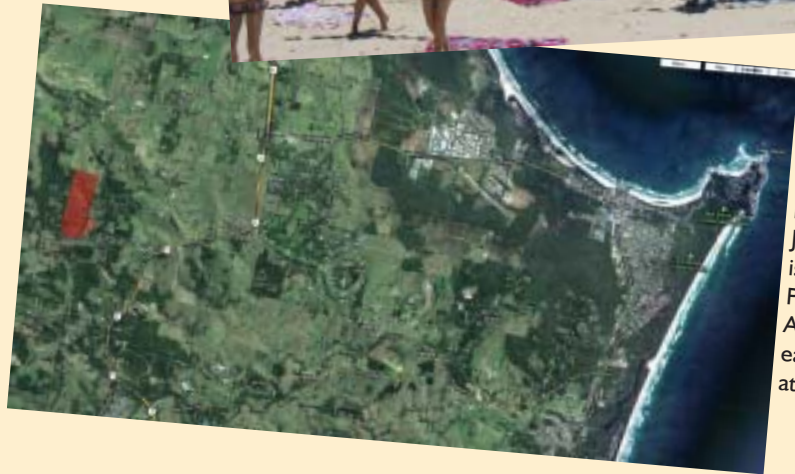
Now with **Community Title**, it is easier for families to obtain bank finance to build their homes, and it feels like the rush is on.

In mid-January 2010, **Kate Haynes** and **Alex Law** moved into their house on Lot 3, and promptly began giving the place an entirely different look and feel. Though both Kate and Alex are still on shiftwork (Kate is a doctor, Alex a paramedic), they have managed to revamp their kitchen to better suit their needs, fence off their lot boundary in order to be able to start an orchard, then establish the most luxurious chicken run that this property has seen, which has subsequently been populated with a selection of six handsome hens and one happy rooster.

Kate is looking forward to starting work - daytime hours - at **Bangalow Medical Centre** in January 2011, which will give her more time for yet more study, as well as helping with our regen projects.

Speaking of which, we have just been awarded a **Caring for Our Country** Grant of \$19,914 to fund the '**Sleepy Creek Riparian Restoration Project**'. It's to control weeds and erosion, and plant native species along the creek to create a wildlife corridor. Thanks and congrats to Jenny and Annette for making it happen!

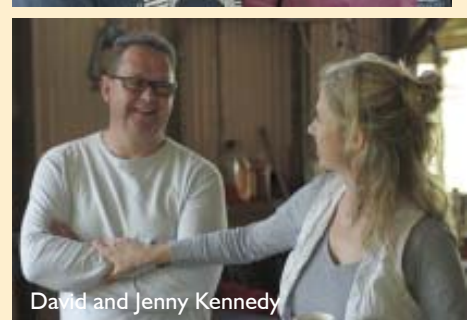

After completing many years of service elsewhere on the property, an old fibreglass water tank was recycled, cut in half, and turned into a waist-high veggie garden by **Christopher**, giving him (and his back) great satisfaction and pleasure, as well as countless carrots, parsnips, onions and heaps of green veggies.

This year **Christobel** extended her orchard and now has an interesting selection of nearly 100 sub-tropical fruit and nut trees. There's a 'spice gardens' with cinnamon, galangal, turmeric, taro and gingers growing among the tropical figs and palms; an avocado grove, Andean and other walnuts, macadamias and pecan nuts; about 10 varieties of citrus; dragon fruit, Davidson's plums and jaboticabas, pomegranate and jackfruit; mangoes and grapes; passionfruit, blueberries and raspberries; custard apples and kaffir lime. And that doesn't even touch her herb and flower collection...

For the last 18 years, the family has been living on 7 acres in nearby Binna Burra, with their teenagers **Angus** and **Alexandra**. So that they could start planting trees without being eaten by cows, Roland fenced off the lot and got planting. Now house planning is happening.

Back in the U.K., **Pippa Markham** (Lot 2) is completing the final months with the theatrical agency she established decades ago, in preparation to move into the original Fowler farmhouse in 2011. We look forward to meeting **Antony George**, the new man in her life.

Definitely in the lead position for the title of Jindibah **PIONEERS OF THE YEAR** are **Mark and Annette Kern**. Mark always dreamed of building his own home, and this year has been slugging away, apparently little daunted by the massive task. Daily as we drive down our internal road, we observe progress as it happens on Lot 4, cheering them on from the (safe and dry) sidelines.

With more community members living on site, we've spent a great deal of time in meetings. Together we've worked out our budgets for the financial year, and are in an ongoing process to review and refine our **Vision**. This August's tweaking has our vision in a nutshell as follows:

Vision The intention of the Jindibah Community members is to achieve a sustainable balance between social, environmental, and economic life. We value collaboration, mutual respect, support and diversity, and endeavour to create an enjoyable and fulfilling environment for all.

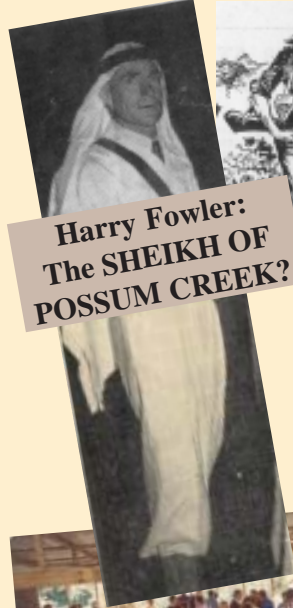
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Harry Fowler's pioneering father Thomas moved to the district in about 1885. At the time he and his wife Selina moved onto the property in about 1903, it was covered with 'standing scrub'. Harry was born here on 26 July 1904 and lived here until his death at 83 years. He left a fabulous and rich legacy of works he performed for the wider community of Bangalow as a 'sportsman, dancer, soldier and horseman', truly a man of diverse interests and skills.

The "official organ of the 2/2nd Australian Infantry Batalion" newspaper dated Feb-Mar 1974 featured a lead article on Harry's life and exploits. To illustrate the article is the photo of Harry, (top left pic) dressed for a local ball as **The Sheikh of Possum Creek**.

We hope Harry would approve of what's been happening this past year in the open-sided community hall which he had built here in the 1950s. This year the hall has seen our community meeting there to discuss budgets, work on our vision, celebrate birthdays, have our monthly community breakfasts (and other feasts), meet with friends from the Bangalow Land and Rivercare Group, and with Fowlers Lane neighbours regarding the state of the lane itself. Re the road, **Alex and Chris** put together a petition, and Alex cycled up and down Fowlers Lane to get 38 signatures on it regarding the state of the road. This was sent to the **Byron Council General Manager** and all Councillors. Later **Alex, Christopher and Christobel** met with Byron Councillors **Patrick Morrissey** and **Basil Cameron** to discuss tactics in dealing with upgrading the road.

Past and present hall stories



Harry Fowler: The SHEIKH OF POSSUM CREEK?



Harry Fowler joined the Australian Army (the 2/2nd Australian Infantry Battalion) at a mass sign-up at the Lismore Showgrounds on Oct 25, 1939. As a corporal, in 1941 he was wounded, taken prisoner in Greece, then spent four years as a German Prisoner-of-War, where his friends say, he was "one of the great morale-builders". Returning to Bangalow in 1945 (his father had died in his absence at war) he purchased the Fowler farm from the estate. Harry learned to ride a horse at the age of four, later becoming a jockey, and was secretary of the Bangalow Pony Club, staging 11 successful gymkhanas.

The Fowler hall was "the scene of some lively times with dancing to the tune of Mrs Fowler's accordion", he said. It was also the venue of Harry's early dancing success, training there to win trophies for ballroom dancing from the 1920s on. Later, he taught hundreds of children to swim in the pool he made with his brothers in Sleepy Creek. Other interests included Legacy, the Ewingsdale Junior Farmers Advisory committee, in which he coached a young team of debaters and "took them to Canberra to win the final of the NSW State Debate for Junior Farmers". He was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for his work with the Bangalow Show Committee, and with a team of volunteers, erected the

poultry pavilion at the Bangalow Showgrounds, named after him.

Our 'Environmental Enhancement and Management Plan' (EEMP) was written in 2002 by **Mark Dunphy** and **Rob Fleetwood** from **Firewheel Rainforest Services**. It guides and directs our 10-year EEMP program, including specifying species. In 2010, we undertook to plant 1400 indigenous seedlings on the steep, eroded south-facing slope designated **R6**, 'R' standing for 'Revegetation'.

To start, the area was an open slope of worn-out pasture. As well as planting the new seedlings - sourced locally from **Liz Gander** at **Ragged Blossom Native Nursery**, the supplier to the **Bangalow Land and Rivercare Group** - the 1000 R6 trees planted in 2009 along our western boundary urgently needed maintenance too, as did the R5 unit.

One particular challenge at R6 was to select the right mulch. If we'd used heavy woodchip (normally good for steep slopes), it would have made the job of mulching all 1400 seedlings extremely costly, not to mention labour-intensive, pushing a wheelbarrow up and down such a steep slope. Finally we decided to trial metre-square weed mats, pinned to the ground. Stay tuned to hear about results!

We are very happy to have **Craig Cumming** supervising our regeneration and maintenance program, a long-time friend of the Kerns. He has worked extensively on the R5 and R6 units this year, as well as supervising our working bees. Our seedlings and young trees are showing the benefits of his tireless care. (His brother **Matt+Annette** bought Lot 6 here this year too.)

This year, just about everyone living here who could apply to the NSW State Government for the Feed-In Tarrif before it was withdrawn, did so. Our motives for buying solar panels for our houses range from wishing to reduce our carbon footprint, reducing the amount of fossil fuel that's being burned, moving towards energy-self-sufficiency in a climate changing world, and saving money.

In June, **Lisa, Michio, Isabelle, Moby and Hapi McMullen** moved into their new home on Lot 5. The skillion-roofed home is situated on a saddle protected from the heavier winds, with excellent views of the largest oldest native fig trees on the property growing just south of the top dry-stone wall.

Late this year, we learned about a program being run by Byron Council called **Land for Wildlife** for which we have just been approved. It relates to conserving and properly managing an area of High Conservation Value for wildlife habitat.

As part of a process to better understand the likely impact on our lives of climate change, **Christopher** has been keeping watch on the state of the planet, attending seminars and meeting as many influential authors and leaders in the field as he can, absorbing the scientific evidence and blogging his summaries to friends and family. This year he met Tom Blees (*Prescription for the Planet*), Dr James Hansen (*Storms of my Grandchildren*), Clive Hamilton (*Requiem for a Species*), Guy Pearse (*High & Dry*), Bill McKibben - founder 350.org, David Holmgren (*Future Scenarios*) and others.

Who's doing what



Following in the footsteps of Harry 'Chook' Fowler, **Kate** (at left) has collected a selection of rare breed chickens on Lot 3, including Chick Pea and Cotton Tail (both **Light Sussex**), Hetty (a **Barred Plymouth Rock**), Missy (an Australorp) and Speckled Hen (a **Speckled Sussex**). 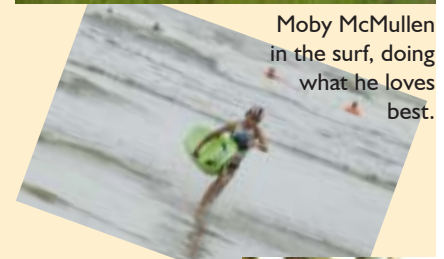
